**Squirrels at Ivy Creek** *Created for use by the Ivy Creek Foundation* 

When you explore Ivy Creek Natural Area, you often see squirrels running on the ground or climbing

up a tree. Gray squirrels are fascinating to watch. They are great little acrobats who can balance on the smallest of limbs and jump from tree to tree. Gray squirrels live in a nest made of leaves and twigs called a drey. You can find the nests high up in the fork of a tall tree. Sometimes squirrels make their nest in the hole of a hollow tree. To find the nests, look for large groups of brown leaves.





Gray squirrels have bushy tails that they use to help them balance on branches. They also use their tails as a blanket when they sleep and as an umbrella when it rains. Gray squirrels eat acorns and other nuts, seeds, buds, and sometimes insects. They often bury nuts in the ground to eat later. Sometimes they forget to dig up the nuts and this helps to plant trees in the forest.

Here is a story of a young squirrel who helps his family repair their drey.....


## **Little Squirrel Helps**

The nest is high up in a fork of a tall oak tree. It shelters the family of squirrels from the rain and heat and cold.




